

ISMA CODING CORNER



As October 1, 2016 approaches, and one year has passed since the implementation of ICD-10-CM, the World Health Organization is giving early previews of what is happening with ICD-11-CM and the timeline for this revision.

2016 - Technical development and release

2017 – Field testing and technical work

2018 – First update to be presented at the World Health Assembly for endorsement

Let's review how we got to ICD-10-CM. Once a version is released, many nations like the United States then adapt it for their needs and the implementation process begins. It took the United States 17 years to implement ICD-10-CM after it was released by the federal government. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) maintains ICD-10-CM was always a building block for the implementation of ICD-11-CM.

ICD-11 has five new chapters: Diseases of the Blood and Blood-forming Organs; Disorders of the Immune System; Conditions Related to Sexual Health; Sleep-Wake Disorders; Extension Codes; Traditional Medicine ICD-11 has a new coding scheme with chapter numbers in Arabic rather than Roman and an additional letter in the second character, differentiating it from ICD-10. A sneak preview from Healthcare Business Monthly published by AAPC (July 2016 edition) reveals the following:

Examples: Type 1 diabetes mellitus – 6A10

Diabetic retinopathy – MG45

Type 1 diabetic mellitus with diabetic retinopathy – 6110/MG45

September, 2016 ISMA LIAISON REPORT

Changes to INSPECT law: In July, changes took effect in Indiana's prescription monitoring program, INSPECT. Patients INSPECT reports can now be included in their medical record....with Limitations. The law specifies an INSPECT report cannot be disclosed to a third party. Exceptions include: Another physician authorized to receive INSPECT information, Law enforcement officers, Investigators for certain state offices, The state toxicologist, The county coroner, A Medicaid representative of the prospective drug utilization review program, A substance abuse assistance program for a licensed health care provider. Emergency Departments in Indiana now have guidelines, checklist to help with Opioid Prescribing: Recommendations were recently endorsed and released by the Governor's Task Force on Drug Enforcement, Treatment and Prevention. These guidelines are aimed at curbing overprescribed addictive opioids. They can serve as another tool to help physicians in the ED with managing pain in patients with acute injuries and illnesses and used in conjunction with their own expertise, experience and training. CHARGING PATIENTS FOR COPIES OF THEIR MEDICAL RECORDS: For many years, Indiana law has set the fees health care providers can charge for copies of medical records. The HIPPA Privacy Rule in 2003 created an enforceable, legal right of access for patients to request copies of their medical records. It also added a new layer of restrictions on what can be charged for copies of protected health information (PHI). Recent HIPPA guidance clarified permissible fees for copies of medical records, reasserting that fees must be reasonable and cost-based. The HIPPA law offers a variety of permissible approaches to medical record fees: No Charge, Flat Fee & Cost Plus. Note that despite Indiana law explicitly allowing per page copy fees, HIPPA does not permit charging per page for copies of PHI maintained electronically. HIPPA also would not permit the flat \$20 labor fee, the \$10 expedite fee or the \$20 certification fee permitted by Indiana law for any type of records—paper or electronic. Review your policies and practices to ensure you are not charging such fees.

Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI): Condition Information

What is TBI?

TBI is a sudden injury from an external force that affects the functioning of the brain. It can be caused by a bump or blow to the head (closed head injury) or by an object penetrating the skull (called a penetrating injury). Some TBIs result in mild, temporary problems, but a more severe TBI can lead to serious physical and psychological symptoms, coma, and even death.1

TBI includes (but is not limited to) several types of injury to the brain:

Skull fracture occurs when the skull cracks. Pieces of broken skull may cut into the brain and injure it, or an object such as a bullet may pierce the skull and enter the brain.

Contusion is a bruise of the brain, in which swollen brain tissue mixes with blood released from broken blood vessels. A contusion can occur from the brain shaking back and forth against the skull, such as from a car collision or sports accident or in shaken baby syndrome.

Intracranial hematoma occurs when damage to a major blood vessel in the brain or between the brain and the skull causes bleeding.1,2

Anoxia absence of oxygen to the brain, causes damage to the brain tissue.

The most common form of TBI is concussion.1 A concussion can happen when the head or body is moved back and forth quickly, such as during a motor vehicle accident or sports injury. Concussions are often called "mild TBI" because they are usually not life-threatening. However, they still can cause serious problems, and research suggests that repeated concussions can be particularly dangerous.3,4

A person who has a TBI may have some of the same symptoms as a person who has a non-traumatic brain injury. Unlike TBI, this type of injury is not caused by an external force, but is caused by an internal problem, such as a stroke or infection. Both types of injury can have serious, long-term effects on a person's cognition and functioning.5,6

TBI can happen to anyone, but certain groups face a greater risk for TBI than others. TBI among members of the military has become a particular concern in recent years because many military personnel in Iraq and Afghanistan have been exposed to such TBI hazards as improvised explosive devices. Head and neck injuries, including severe brain trauma, have been reported in 1 out of 4 military members who were evacuated from those conflicts. For more information about brain injury in the military, visit the Defense and Veterans Brain Injury Center website.

What are common TBI symptoms?

TBI symptoms vary depending on the extent of the injury and the area of the brain affected. Some symptoms appear immediately; others may appear several days or even weeks later. A person with TBI may or may not lose consciousness—loss of consciousness is not always a sign of severe TBI.

Symptoms of Mild TBI

A person with a mild TBI may experience:

Headache

Confusion

Lightheadedness

Dizziness

Blurred vision

Ringing in the ears

Tiredness or sleepiness

A bad taste in the mouth

A change in sleep habits

Behavior or mood changes

Trouble with memory, concentration, attention, or thinking

Loss of consciousness lasting a few seconds to minutes 1

Sensitivity to light or sound

Nausea or vomiting2

Symptoms of Moderate or Severe TBI

A person with moderate or severe TBI may have some of the symptoms listed above. In addition, the person may experience any of the following:

- Headache that gets worse or won't go away
- Repeated vomiting or nausea
- Slurred speech
- Convulsions or seizures
- An inability to wake up from sleep
- Enlargement of the pupil (dark center) of one or both eyes
- Numbness or tingling of arms or legs
- Loss of coordination
- Increased confusion, restlessness, or agitation

Loss of consciousness lasting a few minutes to hours²

A person who suffers a blow to the head or another trauma that may have caused a TBI should seek medical attention.⁴

How many people are affected by or at risk for TBI?

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), approximately 1.7 million people experience a TBI in the United States each year. This number does not include injuries seen at military or Veterans Health Administration health facilities.

CDC data show that about 53,000 people in the United States die from TBI-related causes every year.²

Anyone can experience TBI because it is caused by common events such as car crashes, sports injuries, and falls. However, certain groups of people are more likely to sustain a TBI. The age groups in which TBI is most common are:

- Children up to 4 years old
- Adolescents 15 to 19 years old

Adults 65 and older

Within every age group, TBI rates are higher for males than for females.¹

In addition, active duty and reserve service members, who engage in dangerous training and operational activities in addition to combat, face a greater risk of TBI than their civilian peers.³
